Welcome to the 2017 Air Race Classic! This year marks the 41st running of our race — the premier transcontinental speed competition for women pilots. It is the oldest race of its kind in the nation, with roots dating back to the 1929 Women's Air Derby. The current Air Race Classic is a 501(c)(3) organization focused on encouraging and educating women pilots and preserving and promoting the tradition of female aviation pioneers. The 118 ladies who will participate in the 2017 race include some of the finest female aviators flying today, representing multiple facets of women in aviation in our country. The Air Race Classic would not be possible without the dedication and enthusiasm of our loyal fans and volunteers throughout the country. Directors, Assistant Directors and Race Officials spend thousands of hours annually planning, executing and managing the race. Airplane Qualifications, Race Handicaps, and Scoring

The Air Race Classic (ARC) is an annual VFR all women cross-country event flown in official ARC daylight hours. Airplanes with at least 125 horsepower (HP) and not more than 500 HP may compete in one of two classes: Competition or Non-Competition.

Competition Class includes Stock and modified Stock, normally aspirated, piston-powered airplanes, rated for continuous operation at maximum engine speed. Non-Competition Class includes airplanes not qualifying in Competition Class per ARC rules and those teams, not racing, but flying the event solely for education and experience. Both classes follow the same rules and enjoy similar flying adventures over the 2,400+ statute-mile course.

Handicaps are the basis for the ARC competitive race. They are a method to allow all ARC entry-qualified make and model airplanes to compete against one another in the same race. Prior to the race, each airplane is flown to determine the handicap for that particular airplane based on its current, demonstrated best speed. During the race, designated flybys incorporate special FAA-approved flight procedures that allow all teams to be timed at the start and finish of each ARC race leg. Winners are determined after all airplanes arrive at and cross the final finish line. Official scores are calculated for each race leg by taking an airplane's ground speed, subtracting any applicable penalties, and then subtracting the airplane's handicap.

Once the first plane launches, the teams have four days to fly all race legs and to arrive and cross the Terminus finish line.





Frederick Municipal Airport (KFDK) was dedicated in 1949 and the administration building was named in honor of Lt. William T. Delaplaine III, the first Frederick airman killed in World War II. Today, KFDK is the preferred airport in the National Capital Regional for recreational pilots and corporate operators alike. The airport is home to the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association (AOPA) and offers a federal contract tower, two runways, ILS capability, and a full service FBO. KFDK is conveniently positioned outside the Washington D.C. Special Flight Rules Area (SFRA) and is classified as a general aviation reliever airport serving regional and national markets.

Welcome to Coshocton, Ohio, and the Richard Downing Airport!

Nestled in the rolling foothills of Appalachian country, Coshocton County is a destination where you will find a restored 1830s canal town, award-winning wineries, tours of the renowned Longaberger Basket factory, and more.

The county of Coshocton, established in 1811, is derived from an Indian word meaning "black bear town." It has grown from a small frontier and farming community to a modern agricultural city. It still has some of the state's richest farm lands as it lies along the Muskingum, Walhonding and Tuscarawas Rivers.

In 1830 a section of the Ohio and Erie Canal opened through the town. Today, we still celebrate our rich history by inviting visitors to take a step back in time in our restored canal town, Roscoe Village. In 1855 railroads were added — Unusual Junction, home to the historic 1895 Fredricktown Station, still pays tribute to these railroads.

The Coshocton County Regional Airport Authority was created in 1965, and with the donation of the 324 acres by the estate of Richard Downing, a Cleveland businessman and aviation enthusiast, the airport opened in 1969. At Richard Downing Airport, we take pride in our fast, friendly and high quality service. We offer full service fueling, airplane tie-downs, a spacious and comfortable terminal building, a pilot lounge with flight planning computers and television, spotless restroom/shower facilities, free coffee and popcorn, a courtesy van, maintenance services provided by Missionary Maintenance Services and rental cars available through Mission Auto Connection.

Located on three acres near the airport is an amphitheater that hosts outdoor entertainment including a July 4th fireworks display, the Wings Over Coshocton Airshow, which has hosted the Navy Tac Demo F-18s and the Air Force A-10 Warthogs, and we are currently planning various drama presentations. Indianapolis Regional Airport (KMQJ)

Welcome to the Indianapolis Regional Airport and Indy Jet! We look forward to welcoming the Air Race Classic to KMQJ. Indianapolis is the "Crossroads of America" located within a one-day drive of most of the U.S. — even shorter by air! It is also home to the world's largest one day sporting event, the Indianapolis 500 run on the famous Indianapolis Motor Speedway, the Brickyard. In 2016, the Speedway hosted the 7th round of the Red Bull Air Race World Championship.

Indianapolis Regional Airport (formerly Mount Comfort) is located in Hancock County. It was planned and developed by the Indianapolis Airport Authority in the 1970s to be a premier reliever airport serving general aviation. Capable of serving business jets on the primary runway, and with a crosswind runway to enhance the airport's utility for the smaller users, the airport accommodates a diverse range of aviation users. The largest in a system of reliever airports for Indianapolis International Airport, Indianapolis Regional Airport has significant development potential and has seen many changes in recent years, including a 500' extension of the primary runway and large new corporate aircraft hangars. A new piston/turbine maintenance facility is currently under construction. Located just two miles north of Interstate 70, Indy Regional provides quick and easy access to downtown Indianapolis and the surrounding area.

Indy Jet is your full service FBO on the field. Located a mere twenty minutes from Downtown Indianapolis, we understand that saving time and money is imperative to your operations. Our customer service staff is excited to meet and exceed your expectations.

Our most notable amenities include heated hangars, a pilot's lounge, complimentary gym passes, flight planning room, on-site rental cars, complimentary crew car, Wi-Fi, conference room, and a turbine and piston aircraft service center.

The American Military Heritage Foundation (AMHF), owns a rare Lockheed PV-2 Harpoon, "Hot Stuff," which is located on the field. It has been described as a tailwheel version of the North American B–25 Mitchell. If you have a few minutes during your stay in Indy, consider checking it out. The AMHF is working towards establishing a hangar museum that will showcase aircraft used in our World Wars.

The Indianapolis Aero Club, founded in 1933, is playing a major role in hosting our Air Race Classic stop. This group traces its roots back to the Aero Club of Indianapolis and the 464th Pursuit Squadron of 1922 — nearly 100 years! These pilots and aviation enthusiasts are all about promoting aviation. They are looking forward to the arrival of the ARC racers and planes on the field in June. The club has an active speaker series and scholarship program. It hosts many aviation events from Young Eagles to the Navy's Blue Angels and Air Force Thunderbirds.

Decorah arose as a center of many Norwegian settlements in the mid-1800s and is known for its Norwegian-American culture. Luther College was founded in 1861 and continues today as a liberal arts college affiliated with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. In July, Decorah hosts Nordic Fest, a celebration of Norwegian culture with ethnic dancing, food, and music. The Vesterheim Norwegian-American Museum is the largest museum in the U.S. devoted to one single immigrant group.

If you have the time, explore the historic downtown area with its shops and restaurants or enjoy the surrounding parks and bluffs. Decorah has an idyllic setting that attracts canoeists, hikers and bicyclists. The views from the limestone bluffs and the hill overlooking Dunning's Springs Park are inspiring. Enjoy a peaceful walk on the trails of Palisades Park. The historic Ice Cave can be found on the riverside road and still houses ice that appears during the spring thaw and remains into summer.

As you scan the skies around Decorah, keep an eye out for the eagles. The Raptor Resource Project specializes in the preservation of falcons, eagles, ospreys, hawks, and owls. Its mission is to preserve and strengthen raptor populations, expand participation in raptor preservation, and help foster the next generation of preservationists. For several years, millions of viewers tune in to watch the livestream of the Decorah Eagles' nest and maintain a watch for the hatching of the eaglets each spring.

The Decorah Municipal Airport brought air service to Northeast Iowa in 1963 and is nestled in the bluff country just two miles east of Decorah. For over 20 years, Mike Connell and Connell Flying Service has served as the FBO for KDEH. Mike was recently inducted into the Iowa Aviation Museum as a "2nd Generation Pioneer." He flew his first solo flight at age 16 and joined his siblings in the family aviation business, Connell

Aviation. Today, Mike is a nationally-recognized leader and expert in aviation in America with extensive training, certifications, and experience in flight, maintenance, and aircraft restoration. Mike and the Connell Flying Service team will welcome you to Decorah, and we hope that your race plans will allow you to visit, explore, and enjoy Decorah.

Bemidji, MN Bemidji Regional Airport (KBJI)

Stop Co-Chairs: Dick Sathers and Karen Weller Airport Executive Director: Karen Weller

Welcome to Bemidji, "First City on the Mississippi" and capital of Minnesota's beautiful Northwoods! Bemidji is a four-season destination for world-class hunting, fishing,

bicycling, boating, and snow sports amid the beauty of pristine waters and towering pines. Take a "selfie" with Paul Bunyan and Babe the Blue Ox on the shore of Lake Bemidji. Navigate the slippery rocks at the headwaters of the Mississippi River. "Bemidji" is derived from the Ojibwe (Chippewa) word Bemejigamaug, referring to the lake with water flowing through it (the Mississippi River). Founded in 1897, the settlement had grown around Carson Trading Post on the southern lakeshore. Logging, the principal occupation at that time, attracted the railroads.

Katherine Stinson, aged 19, of Chicago was the first person to fly an airplane in Bemidji on July 3, 1919. She was part of the Stinson "Flying Family". She flew into Bemidji in a Model Curtis J airplane with a Gnome 80 horsepower, air-cooled engine. The Bemidji Civic and Commerce Association presented property to the City of Bemidji in 1932 to operate an airfield. In 1946, Bemidji Airlines began transporting passengers between KBJI and Minneapolis, even stopping in St. Cloud. North Central Airlines continued air service (1952). Today, Delta Air Lines serves BJI daily with two round trips to MSP.

In 1944, the airfield was designated a "secondary defense airport". It was upgraded with two paved, lit runways as well as two turf runways. The turf runways were abandoned in the 1970s and the main runway 13/31 has been extended to 7,002 feet with taxiways. Modern facility upgrades and expansions have included new weather reporting systems, instrument landing systems, a passenger terminal with jet bridge, and the Airport Rescue & Firefighting (ARFF) station. In 2009, airport management came under the Bemidji Regional Airport Authority with city and county representatives and the ability to levy its own taxes for sustaining the operations and maintenance of the airport.

KBJI is the fourth busiest commercial service airport in Minnesota serving over 50,000 passengers in 2016. Fifteen businesses are located at KBJI with nearly 350 employees and 62 based aircraft. A 2015 report highlighted that KBJI had a regional economic impact of \$41.6M and supported 798 direct/indirect jobs in the County. Bemidji Aviation Services, Inc. is the FBO on the field and offers a full range of services (fuel, aircraft maintenance, tie-downs, charter flights, aircraft management, aircraft rentals, flight instruction, hangar rentals, rental cars). KBJI has an active and growing GA community that includes the Bemidji Interagency Airtanker Base, two air ambulances, several corporate aircraft/hangars, an aircraft restoration company, a flying club, EAA and the Civil Air Patrol.




Edgewood, NM Sandia Airpark Estates East Airport (1N1)

Sandia Airpark Estates East Airport is located in Edgewood, New Mexico, "Where the Mountains Meet the Plains on Historic Route 66". The airpark offers unrestricted views of the surrounding mountains, plains and wildlife. Sandia Airpark (1N1) was founded in 1985 as a private strip for local aviators. Located just 25 miles east of Albuquerque and 45 miles south of Santa Fe, the Airpark is now mainly used for locals commuting to and from Los Alamos labs.

After your final flyby here, as you head to Santa Fe, look for these points of interest from the air: leaving 1N1 to the north you will pass three mountains called South Mountain, San Pedro, and Ortiz. South Mountain was a hide-out for outlaws and rustlers. San Pedro was a gold mining area — you can see several mines there. A 9-oz. gold nugget was found there in the late 1980s. Ortiz Mountain has many mine openings, too, including one open pit mine. This was the first large Spanish discovery in North America. It is considered the source of gold that financed this portion of the Santa Fe Trail. Thomas Edison had a laboratory here for separating gold from ore. Where SH 344 turns east for a short distance, look along that easterly line and you can see waving lines of an 1860 military wagon road to Kansas.






Janet Davidson (Union Bridge, MD) is flying the ARC for the first time. Welcome!

Lilian Bland (1878–1971) Built her own aircraft and was the first woman to fly in Ireland.





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
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Classic Racer #20 DC3 Cessna Skylane 182T

Said Katelyn, "Because of this race I have flown in places that I probably wouldn't have ever thought of flying before. I am very honored to be a part of this historical race."


When she's not flying, Katelyn enjoys spending time with her family, traveling, camping and boating. She is a member of Women in Aviation International.



This trophy is awarded to the school with the highest-scoring collegiate team. The trophy features a soaring bird reflecting the Air Race Classic logo. Plaques are given to the school and the team members for their permanent possession.

Fastest Piper Trophy

Piper Aircraft, Inc. is pleased to continue the Fastest Piper trophy for the 2017 Air Race Classic! The custom Piper trophy is awarded to the crew of the highest placing Piper aircraft in this year's Air Race Classic.

99s Terminus Leg Prize

The Ninety-Nines, Inc., International Organization of Women Pilots, award a \$100 cash prize to the race team with the highest score on the 9th or Terminus leg. The winning team must be members of The Ninety- Nines.

The 99s' history with air racing dates back to the 1929 National Air Races when Amelia Earhart and several other competitors met under the grandstand at the finish line in Cleveland. They vowed to form an organization for women aviators, and that group became the Ninety-Nines. Today's Air Race Classic grew out of that first Women's Air Derby.

This award is designed to inspire racers to continue to fly that perfect cross country on the final terminus leg of the race even though the race has been long and hard.

Claude Glasson SOS Award

The lowest-scoring team without penalties will win the perennially treasured "Turtle" award and a \$100 cash prize.

Esther Lowry Safford Rookie Racer Award

Esther Lowry Safford was one of the original six extraordinary women, who founded the Air Race Classic. She remained an avid supporter of the race, and prior to her death, she established the Rookie Racer Award for a pilot or co-pilot flying her first Air Race Classic. The awardee is selected based on a short essay "Why I Fly." The winner receives a \$500 cash prize.
