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

Airplane Qualifications, Race Handicaps, and Scoring

The Air Race Classic (ARC) is an annual VFR all women cross-country event flown in official ARC daylight hours. Airplanes with at least 100 horsepower (HP) and not more than 600 HP may compete in one of two classes: Competition or Non-Competition. Competition Class includes Stock and modified Stock, normally aspirated, piston-powered airplanes, rated for continuous operation at maximum engine speed. Non-Competition Class includes airplanes not qualifying in Competition Class per ARC rules and those teams, not racing, but flying the event solely for education and experience. Both classes follow the same rules and enjoy similar flying adventures over the 2,400+ statute-mile course.



Handicaps are the basis for the ARC competitive race. They are a method to allow all ARC entry-qualified make and model airplanes to compete against one another in the same race. Prior to the race, each airplane is flown to determine the handicap for that particular airplane based on its current, demonstrated best speed. During the race, designated flybys incorporate special FAA-approved flight procedures that allow all teams to be timed at the start and finish of each ARC race leg. Winners are determined after all airplanes arrive at and cross the final finish line. Official scores are calculated for each race leg by taking an airplane's ground speed, subtracting any applicable penalties, and then subtracting the airplane's handicap.

Once the first plane launches, the teams have four days to fly all race legs and to arrive and cross the Terminus finish line. No preliminary results will be released, but you can follow the race and see each team's progress nightly at www.airraceclassic.org when their locations are posted.



With its 3,067 acre airport complex, Mid-American Air Center (MAAC) is the third largest airport in Illinois. This is a self-contained airport facility with its own utilities and infrastructure. It is operated by the Bi-State Authority, which represents the State of Illinois, the State of Indiana, and the cities of Lawrenceville (IL) and Vincennes (IN).

This former Army Air Corps Base, George Army Airfield, was home to the training of some 4,500 flight students during World War II. They trained in the Beechcraft AT-10 and then later for troop carrier command using C-46 and C-47 aircraft to tow gliders and transport troops.

Today's Mid-American Air Center is the host to various flight training operations. The Wabash Valley Soaring Association is a long-time active part of the airport and

recently located its Sailplane Archives on the second floor of the terminal. There are various other aviation activities, such as aircraft painting, repairing and servicing. MAAC also has an ultralight sod runway.

Although future plans of the airport include air cargo and aircraft maintenance, we will always



keep in mind the needs of the communities that we represent in order for them to remain a part of our public-use airport. This airport has served our country well, and we are committed to serving your future needs.

We look forward to hosting the Air Race Classic racers at MAAC. See you soon.

Welcome to Kirksville, Missouri's North Star. Kirksville is the home of Truman State University and A.T. Still University's Missouri School of Dentistry and Oral Health and the founding school of Osteopathic Medicine. Kirksville hosts weekly Summer on the Square concerts, the farmer's market, and many annual festivals - Round Barn Blues, Red Barn Arts Festival, and the Scottish Highland Games. Kirksville Regional Airport was established in 1930 as a Federal Aviation Administration emergency landing strip. In 1942, it became one of the United States government's Civil Pilots Training Program Centers and a War Training Service Center for the Army Air Corps. IRK was renamed the Clarence Canon Memorial Airport in 1971 in honor of Congressman Clarence Canon and then renamed the Kirksville Regional Airport in 1984.

Kirksville Regional Airport (IRK) is an FAA Part 139 airport supporting commercial services and capable of servicing large corporate jets. A small airport offering big services with over 6,000 feet of runway, ILS, REILS, VASI, MALSR, ADSB, VOR-DME, ASOS and a newly installed HIRL system, Kirksville MO is



one of the best kept secrets for Jet-A and cross-country fuel stops. We set the standard for quick turns by taking fewer than 20 minutes (under normal conditions) to refuel aircraft and get them on their way.

Kirksville Airport and the FBO are owned and operated by the City of Kirksville and have made major strides in improving services. New and updated equipment, GPU, great local catering, on-site A&P and

avionics services, contract fuel, and more helps us provide great service to our customers. With fast turns and always attractive fuel prices, we are quickly growing our customer base.

Gadsden, AL

Northeast Alabama Regional Airport (GAD)

Northeast Alabama Regional Airport was originally deeded to the City of Gadsden by the Federal Government. It has evolved, through the years, from a passenger service airport to a General Aviation facility. The airport features two runways, 42 hangars for private pilot use, and 6 corporate hangars used for storage and aircraft maintenance.

Runway 06/24 is 6802'x150' and runway 18/36 is 4806'x100'. Runway 06/24 has recently been completely refinished and 18/36 was recently seal-coated and striped. In addition to the runway work, taxiway Alpha and the maintenance hangar apron were sealed and restriped in 2014.

The airport has a maintenance facility, International Jets, that not only refurbishes L-39 jets but also has a paint shop, which services all types of aircraft. In addition to this facility, we have the 20th Special Forces military unit that is housed on our airport and uses the airport for many military operations. An ILS (instrument landing system) was recently added to further facilitate safe landing procedures.

The FBO has free wi-fi and a crew car for passenger use.

Northeast Alabama Regional Airport is located 50 miles north of Birmingham and 55 miles east of Huntsville.

Conveniently located by I-59 and State Highway 77 and only 30 minutes from I-20, the airport makes access to Birmingham, Atlanta and Chattanooga a short drive. Also, the Talladega Speedway is only 35 minutes away.

If you are a sports enthusiast, you can stay in Gadsden and be just 2 hours from Alabama football, 2½ hours from Auburn and 35 minutes from NASCAR. You will also find recreation and vacation destinations on the Coosa River, Guntersville Lake or Weiss Lake. Visit Noccalula Falls Park, which has a lot of history and interesting artifacts, as well as carpet golf, zoo, and a wedding chapel.

Fairhope's "Sonny" Callahan Airport is located 11 miles south of Interstate 10 on the east side of Mobile Bay. With a 6,600 x 100 ft. runway, it can service up to regional jets. Though non-towered, the facility provides AWOS and GPS non-precision approaches. The FBO operator is Continental Motors which provides engine overhaul and rebuild, airframe, and annual services, among others. In addition, the company operates ZULU Flight Training from the field. Hangar space is available as are sites for privately owned hangars.

In 2007, the Fairhope Airport Authority purchased 250 acres of adjacent land on the east and west sides of the airport. It is envisioned that the west side property will become a light industrial area, not connected to the runway environment, but in close proximity. To that end, the 105 acres of land was recently awarded Advantage Site Status by the State of Alabama EDPA, paving the way for quick development. The east side property will be developed into additional ramp space, a corporate hangar, and a possible future terminal building.

An aviation and industrial maintenance school was constructed at the entrance to the airport in 2014. The school provides dual enrollment opportunities for high school students, as well as career development for college and adult students, creating a trained workforce for prospective employers.







2015 Air Race Classic Route









When she's not flying, Eileen enjoys interior design, clothing design, dancing and working out every day.




This is the first Air Race Classic for Mary (Katie) Hale. Welcome!

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

When she's not flying, Jen enjoys running, cycling, hiking and kayaking. She is a member of the UND Chapter of Women in Aviation International.





Eva is a physical therapist who loves her home health practice, especially the one-on-one time with her clients that allows her to personalize each program for their needs.



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
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Preserving Women's Air Racing for Generations to Come Introducing The Air Race Classic Endowment Fund

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
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

Air Race Classic Collegiate Challenge Trophy

This trophy is awarded to the highest-scoring college or university team. The school and team holds the trophy for one year. Plaques are given to the school and the team members for their permanent possession when the trophy is returned to the Air Race Classic.

99s Terminus Leg Trophy

The Ninety-Nines, Inc., International Organization of Women Pilots, recently presented a new Perpetual Trophy to the ARC. It is awarded to the race team with the highest score on the 9th or Terminus leg. The winning team must be members of The Ninety-Nines. A smaller trophy is presented to the race team as a keepsake.

The 99s' history with air racing dates back to the 1929 National Air Races when Amelia Earhart and several other competitors met under the grandstand at the finish line in Cleveland. They vowed to form an organization for women aviators, and that group became the Ninety-Nines. So today's Air Race Classic grew out of that first Women's Air Derby.

This award is designed to inspire racers to continue to fly that perfect cross country on the final terminus leg of the race even though the race has been long and hard.

Without realizing the future impact of their benevolence, Linda Schumm and Rosemary Emhoff of Legacy Aviation, Inc., created something immeasurably valuable for the Air Race Classic when they declared a new award category at the 2000 ARC Awards banquet and personally provided prizes for each collegiate team.

When the Air Race Classic achieved 501(c)3 status, with the goal of supporting aviation education for women of all ages, taking the next step to encourage the participation of collegiate teams was easy. We established the Air Race Classic Collegiate Challenge Trophy to be presented annually to the top-finishing collegiate team.

The large traveling trophy, engraved with the winning teams' names, dwells in the victor's school trophy case for one year before moving to the next winner's school. In addition, engraved plaques for the top four collegiate winning teams are sent to the universities for permanent display. Winning team members receive cash awards and also award certificates.



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
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
