The Airports Division manages two general aviation airports; Buchanan Field and Byron Airports. The County Airports staff extends a warm welcome to all of the participants of this years' cross country race which will begin at the Buchanan Field Airport.

Buchanan Field Airport is located strategically between, and a short drive from, San Francisco and the Napa Valley with the picturesque Mount Diablo in the background (see picture at right). The Buchanan Field Airport dates back to the 1930s and served as a fighter pilot training airport for World War II. The Buchanan Field Airport is small but mighty; less than 500 acres with over 500 based aircraft and 30 businesses to serve all of your aviation needs.

The Federal Aviation Administration provides air traffic control and other NAVAIDS. The transient ramp behind the Crowne Plaza Hotel (which also is on County Airport property) will be the site for the staging and activities prior to the start of the Air Race Classic.

Elko, NV

Elko Regional Airport (EKO)

Welcome to the Great American West, land of adventure, capable of stretching the limits of your interests and favorite pastimes to their fullest. The raw majesty of Elko County's Ruby Mountains and the rugged canyon streams will let you discover the unspoiled beauty of the West.

The city of Elko sits in Northeastern Nevada at an elevation of 5,060 feet. This high desert community experiences four mild and colorful annual seasons. In 1925, the Kelly Act (also known as the Airmail Act of 1925) authorized the U.S. Post Office to contract with private airlines for the feeder routes that fed the main



transcontinental route. The first commercial airmail flight in the United States was on the 487 mile Airmail Route #5 from Pasco, WA to what would become Elko Regional Airport on April 6, 1926.

Elko maintains its roots in ranching and mining. Cattle outnumber humans in the county by about 3:1. The Ruby Mountains are enjoyed by skiers, hikers, fishermen, hunters, ATV enthusiasts and horseback riders. Lamoille Canyon is spectacular all four seasons of the year. Elko hosts the National Cowboy Poetry Gathering, a Basque Festival, the Silver State Stampede, and the Ruby Mountain Balloon Festival to name a few popular annual events.

Elko Regional Airport, "Your Connection to the Heart of Nevada" is the primary commercial service airport for Elko County, Nevada. Its primary runway is 7,214 feet long and 150 feet wide with VASI, but it also has a shorter crosswind runway. While Elko remains one of

the oldest publically owned airports in the nation, it is now a fully modern facility with a beautiful 20,000 square foot passenger terminal and a full menu cafe. The local favorite Come and Get It

Pinedale, WY

Ralph Wenz Field (PNA)

We welcome the 2014 Air Race Classic to Pinedale, Wyoming and wish each of you a safe and pleasant flight.

Founded in 1939, Ralph Wenz Field was little more than a couple of grass runways. The airport was named in memory of Ralph Wenz, who was well known in the Pinedale area and was involved with testing cold weather equipment as a navigator in the Army Air Corps in Alaska.



Today, Ralph Wenz Field is a busy general aviation airport located six miles southeast of Pinedale and is regularly used by larger business jet aircraft and smaller single and multi-engine aircraft. Runway 11/29 is 8,900 feet long by 100 feet wide and has a full parallel taxiway. The airport is owned by the Town of Pinedale and managed by the Pinedale Airport Board. Ralph Wenz Field has a full service FBO, Emblem Aviation, which provides fueling, maintenance, hangar facilities, and car rentals.



Pinedale is a true western town and a gateway to the Bridger Wilderness. "Roam free in a world of mountains, glacial lakes, rivers, & wildlife." It's a must-see for pilots who want to fly over Fremont Lake, Wyoming's second largest lake, and over the beautiful 100-mile long Wind River Mountain Range. The Range is a destination for hikers, backpackers, and rock climbers. The scenic stopover opens the door to a rich historic culture. In June, you might have the chance to fly above the Green River Drift, one of the nation's longest and oldest running cattle drives, or the Path of the

Pronghorn, the 6,000 year old prehistoric route of pronghorn antelope migrating from Pinedale to their summer grounds in Grand Teton National Park.

Reminder: During the hotter summer months, it's important to consider the airport's 7,085' elevation and density altitude factors, making it more difficult for aircraft to take off with a full load of fuel and passengers.

Western Nebraska Regional Airport - William B. Heilig Field (BFF)

Scottsbluff is excited to participate in the 2014 Air Race Classic. Located at the Wyoming edge of Nebraska, Scottsbluff is a visually stunning landscape with the winding North Platte River, distinctive rock formations and sprawling prairie. The Fossil Freeway is a one-of-a-kind highway corridor between Nebraska's Panhandle and The Black Hills in South Dakota.





Scotts Bluff National Monument includes five magnificent rock formations - Crown Rock, Dome Rock, Eagle Rock, Saddle Rock, and Sentinel Rock. These and the nearby Chimney Rock National Historic Site were significant landmarks for pioneers travelling on the Mormon, Oregon, and California Trails.

William B. Heilig Field was established in 1943. Its beautiful terminal building supports scheduled airline service. With 8,000 foot

crossing runways, the field is home to an aerial spraying service and a charter business as well. A spacious restaurant and lounge is located in the terminal building with a lovely attached patio overlooking the ramp. The fixed base operator, Valley Airways, provides full support to general aviation, including 100LL fuel and aircraft maintenance.

Touch the history (and have some fun on the way) in Nebraska's Landmark Country, the Scottsbluff / Gering Area.

Feel the presence of the pioneers, and follow your own destiny to Western Nebraska and beyond.

Iowa City Municipal Airport (IOW)

Welcome to the birthplace of commercial aviation in lowa! The lowa City Municipal Airport opened in 1918 and is the oldest public airport west of the Mississippi River still in its original location. In 1921, during the first overnight transcontinental air mail delivery, Jack Knight stopped at lowa City's *"Smith Field"* for a designated fuel stop during his flight between Omaha and Chicago. This historic flight demonstrated the speed and reliability of the fledgling U.S. Airmail system.





Fast forward nearly 100 years,

and the Iowa City Municipal Airport is now one of the busiest general aviation airports in the state. Jet Air Inc., the full time FBO, provides aircraft fueling, repair services, hangars and tie downs. They also offer charter, fleet management and sales services.

The airport receives traffic ranging from medical helicopters carrying patients for the University of Iowa Hospitals & Clinics, to small jets supporting businesses in the Iowa City area, to many single engine aircraft that make IOW their home. Over the past eight years, the airport has been rehabilitating runways and has just opened its first full parallel taxiway.

Ohio University Airport - Snyder Field (UNI)

Welcome, Air Racers, to the Gordon K. Bush Ohio University Airport. We hope you have time to enjoy our beautiful area before the successful completion of your race.

Athens County is nestled deep in the Appalachian foothills of Southeast Ohio. The lively arts and music scene entertains locals and visitors alike. The eclectic shopping and dining scene is a result of the presence of the university and rich Appalachian heritage. Hunting, kayaking, bouldering, hiking, cycling, and mountain biking are just some of the most popular outdoor activities.



Ohio University is proud that Snyder Field is a vital part of the local, state and national economy. The airport is located about twelve miles southwest of the City of Athens and about one mile southwest of the Village of Albany. The strikingly modern C. David Snyder Terminal opened in 2002, setting the tone for the first class operation it is today. Its single runway 7/25 is 5,600 feet long and 100 feet wide with PAPI lights. In addition to providing 100LL avgas around the clock, Snyder Field is a certified repair station offering major repairs and maintenance. It has a pilot shop onsite as well.

A major contributor to Ohio University Airport's success has been its *flight training program*, started in 1939, and the research and development programs. The University offers Associate degrees in Aviation Technology and Bachelor of Science degrees in Aviation Science. The Avionics Engineering Center specializes in research, development and evaluation of electronic navigational communication and surveillance systems. Harrisburg, PA Capital City Airport (CXY)

Capital City Airport, (FAA identifier CXY), is the general aviation airport of choice for the capital city of Harrisburg and all of Central Pennsylvania.

Originally called Capital Landing Field, the facility opened in mid-1930 and was Harrisburg's original commercial service airport. In 1934, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania purchased the facility and renamed it Harrisburg-York State Airport. The airport provided air service to the capital region and was an intermediate stop on longer air routes, principally the route between Pittsburgh and Philadelphia. During those years, scheduled commercial air service was provided by Transcontinental Airlines, TWA's predecessor, and Western Airlines.

During the 1940's, the airport continued in its role as the third largest airport in Pennsylvania and served an important role in the movement of war materials for the adjacent New Cumberland Army Depot, and as the site of the Naval Photographic Reconnaissance Training School. During the 1950's and 1960's, both air carrier service and the number of FBO's increased steadily until 1968 when Olmstead Air Force Base, located just across the river in Middletown, was closed and all scheduled commercial air service was transferred to newly named Harrisburg International Airport. It was at that time, that Capital City Airport received its current name and became the region's main general aviation airport.

Today, CXY has earned its place as the airport of choice for thousands of general aviation pilots and their passengers. Owned and operated by the Susquehanna Area Regional Airport Authority (SARAA), CXY is the designated reliever and sister airport of Harrisburg International Airport, and serves the business community of Dauphin, Cumberland, and York counties. In addition, a study conducted by the PA Department of Transportation in 2011, concluded that CXY related activities generate nearly \$42 million a year in total economic output into the regional economy.

York Airport (THV) - Terminus flyby / timing

York Airport is seven miles west of York, having moved there from various locations in the York area since its inception. Oscar Hostetter built the airport in the late 1930s and opened a flight school for training army navigators. Years later, the facility became a multi-use venue with drag racing events occurring on Saturday evenings – yet the runway remained open to aviation.

York Building Products Company took over in the 1970s, and York Aviation (FBO) assumed ownership in the 1990s. Today the airport serves as the general aviation gateway to the York community and is home to over 80 aircraft from single engine to business jets. York Airport is proud to serve as the Final Timing Flyby for the 2014 Air Race Classic.

Airplane Qualifications, Race Handicaps, and Scoring

The Air Race Classic (ARC) is an annual VFR all women crosscountry event flown in official ARC daylight hours. Airplanes with at least 100 horsepower (HP) and not more than 600 HP may compete in one of two classes: Competition or Non-Competition. Competition Class includes Stock and modified Stock, normally aspirated, piston-powered airplanes, rated for continuous operation at maximum engine speed. Non-Competition Class includes airplanes not qualifying in Competition Class per ARC rules and those teams, not racing, but flying the event solely for education and experience. Both classes follow the same rules and enjoy similar flying adventures over the 2,400+ statute-mile course.



Handicaps are the basis for the ARC competitive race. They are a method to allow all ARC entryqualified make and model airplanes to compete against one another in the same race. Prior to the race, each airplane is flown to determine the handicap for that particular airplane based on its current, demonstrated best speed. During the race, designated flybys incorporate special FAA-approved flight procedures that allow all teams to be timed at the start and finish of each ARC race leg. Winners are determined after all airplanes arrive at and cross the final finish line. Official scores are calculated for each race leg by taking an airplane's ground speed, subtracting any applicable penalties, and then subtracting the airplane's handicap.

Once the first plane launches, the teams have four days to fly all race legs and to arrive and cross the Terminus finish line. No preliminary results will be released, but you can follow the race and see each team's progress nightly at www.airraceclassic.org when their locations are posted.

A teacher-scholar award made it possible for Diane to write a biography of World War II ferry pilot Evelyn Sharp. It is especially meaningful for her to return to Capital City Airport, where Sharpie lost her life in a forced landing soon after take-off in 1944. Diane is flying this race in memory of Sharpie.

This is the first ARC for **Evelyn Cowing**, but not her first race. Evelyn flew the Powder Puff Derby in 1962, 1969 and 1971. Without realizing the future impact of their benevolence, Linda Schumm and Rosemary Emhoff of Legacy Aviation, Inc., created something immeasurably valuable for the Air Race Classic when they declared a new award category at the 2000 ARC Awards banquet and personally provided prizes for each collegiate team.

When the Air Race Classic achieved 501(c)3 status, with the goal of supporting aviation education for women of all ages, taking the next step to encourage the participation of collegiate teams was easy. We established the Air Race Classic Collegiate Challenge Trophy to be presented annually to the top-finishing collegiate team.

The large traveling trophy, engraved with the winning teams' names, dwells in the victor's school trophy case for one year before moving to the next winner's school. In addition, engraved plaques for the top four collegiate winning teams are sent to the universities for permanent display. Winning team members receive cash awards and also award certificates.

The Air Race Classic gives students wishing to become aviation professionals a unique opportunity to meet and network with other female pilots and to make contacts all around the country. Flying the Air Race Classic not only improves piloting skills, it can enhance employment searches after graduation. Any school with an established aviation program is eligible to send a team of female pilots.

The Air Race Classic traces its lineage back to 1929, the year of the first Women's Air Derby. As we mark the 85th anniversary of women's air racing, we celebrate the college students who benefit from the Air Race Classic experience and who will carry on this glorious tradition.
