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
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

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
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Now recognized as one of the major mid-sized cities in the nation, Wichita has come a long way since its infant years as a trading post and cowtown. The road from "then" to "now" has been filled with colorful people, events and businesses that have been the building blocks for today's cosmopolitan Wichita...a dynamic community rich in culture, activity and opportunity. To understand the success of Wichita today, as well as all the future possibilities, you need to take a quick look back.

The Wild, Wild West!

The beginnings of the community date to 1868, when J.R. Mead founded a trading post on the banks of the confluence of two rivers, the Arkansas and the Little Arkansas. For centuries this location had also served as a trading place for Native Americans. The name Wichita comes from the Wichita Indians, who settled at various times in the vicinity, and means either "scattered lodges" or "painted faces," depending on which historian you ask."

Move Along, Little Doggies!

Within a year of incorporation, Wichita experienced phenomenal growth, due largely to the cattle trade from Texas. So rapid was the population growth that in late 1872, Wichita became a city of the second class.

Spurred by this influx of cowboys in the 1870s who brought hundreds of thousands of cattle out of Texas north to Wichita along the Chisholm Trail, Wichita was indeed a rough and tumble cowtown. Wichita fell on hard times in the late 1870s when the cattle trade moved further west to take advantage of the construction of rail lines. But, by 1880, the city had rebounded with a growing economy in agriculture and manufacturing. Todays Wichita Area Chamber of Commerce dates from 1917.

Even though the cattle trade lasted only three or four years, its presence assured Wichita's position as a commercial hub. With the trade groundwork firmly established, manufacturing and agriculture industries thrived in the late teens and early 1920s. In addition, savvy aviation entrepreneurs moved in to take advantage of the benefits of a prosperous oil industry, agreeable climate and wide open spaces perfect for building and testing these new birds of flight.

Those Magnificent Men and Their Flying Machines!

Men like Lloyd Stearman, Walter Beech, Clyde Cessna, E.M. Laird, J.M. Mollendick and George Weaver were responsible for starting the aircraft industry in the area. With Mollendick as the financial backer, Laird started the Swallow Airplane Company to build the Swallow airplane.

By 1929, Wichita was the heart of the aviation world. It boasted 11 airports with 1,640 acres of

flying fields. It had close to 100 aircraft-related businesses, including 16 factories, six engine factories, 25 accessory firms, seven service firms, nine air transportation firms, 12 flying schools and two manufacturers of flying togs. The 2,000 men and women employed in the aircraft plants were capable of producing 120 airplanes a week.

Interestingly, Beech, Stearman, and Weaver all worked for Laird and Mollendick in the early days . Stearman's company was purchased by Boeing of Seattle. Today it is Wichita's largest employer with more than 20,000 employees. The Beech (now Raytheon Aircraft Co.) and Cessna companies continue today, as does Learjet (now Bombardier Aerospace Learjet), founded by William Lear in the mid 1960s. It was through the efforts of these aviation pioneers that Wichita earned the title of "Air Capital of the World." With all companies still located in Wichita, that title firmly remains today. Cessna, Bombardier Aerospace Learjet and Raytheon supply more than half of the world's general aviation and military

aircraft. Boeing supplies two-thirds of the world's airliners.

Entrepeneurial Successes!

It was not only aviation that established Wichita as a hotbed of entrepreneurship. Many other Wichita business leaders have made their mark too. W.C. Coleman, a name synonymous worldwide with camping and outdoor recreational equipment, produced his first Coleman lantern in Wichita in 1914. In the same era, another innovative business leader. A.A. Hyde, invented a product that became a household word...mentholatum. Later, White Castle hamburgers started here. In 1958 the first Pizza Hut in Wichita in a small red-bricked building.

Originally established as the Wood River Oil and Refining Company in 1940, Koch Industries has become one of the most diverse firms in the nation. Koch operations include refined products, chemicals, crude oil services,

gas liquids, energy services, chemical technology, minerals services, agriculture and capital services.

Charge!

Obviously, Wichita has come a long way since its beginnings as a trading post and cowtown. Right now, Wichita is a booming city with one of the best economies in the nation...the midwest spirit of hard work and vision...and a pioneer spirit all dressed up in high tech fashion.



While Lamar is a town of "wide open spaces," it is also the major economic center in southeast Colorado. Historically, the local economy features both irrigated crops such as alfalfa and corn as well as dryland wheat. The surrounding country is also excellent for raising cattle. More recently, manufacturing has become a strong economic base. Some eleven major firms produce items for the national and international trade, spanning everything from meat product to buses.



The town grew with the western thrust of the Santa Fe Railroad. Lucius Lamar,

a Southern Statesman who was influential in re-uniting the North and South after

the Civil War, Secretary of the Interior, and a member of the U. S. Supreme Court, was a key figure in the town's early growth. But he had powerful opponents and the clash makes for a colorful local history!

Today, Lamar has excellent local services and health care. Aviation has always been an important part of life in Lamar. Today, strong civic pride supports a number of events, including a parachuting and skydiving meet (Sept. 2004), an airshow with the very appropriate name "Planes to Plains" (August 28, 2004) and the Rocky Mountain Invitational Aerobatic contest (Oct. 15-17, 2004).



Born in 1866 as the Union Pacific Railroad thrust its iron rails across the prairies, North Platte has been closely associated with railroading and ranch country. Located at the southeastern corner of the Nebraska Sandhills, at the confluence of the North and South Platte rivers, North Platte is truly the "Gateway to the Cattle Country."

Organized as a city in 1873, North Platte was a stopping point for the Oregon Trail, Mormon Trail, Pony Express, Overland Trail, and the Union Pacific Railroad. Through this area came fur traders bound for the Rockies, farmers seeking Oregon land, Colorado prospectors, and 200,000 pioneers who migrated west by wagon train. The name "Platte," meaning flat or shallow, came from French traders.

An early resident was "Buffalo Bill" Cody, who lived her for more than thirty years. On July 4, 1882, Cody staged a local celebration, the Old Glory Blowout, which turned out to be the world's first recorded rodeo.

Geographically, North Platte is midway between Chicago and Salt Lake City, as well as halfway between Omaha and Denver. With this advantageous location, it is the site of the world's largest railroad yard. Covering more than 2,850 acres, Bailey Yard is named in honor of Edd Bailey, former president of the Union Pacific Railroad and a North Platte native.

The North Platte of today is home to around 25,000 friendly people, who enjoy the clean air, water and environment. Education is a top priority in North Platte, with numerous schools and a two-year community college. While North Platte's roots are firmly planted in history, its face is set toward the future.



The quad cities of Virginia, Eveleth, Mountain Iron, and Gilbert form the nucleus for the eastern end of the Iron Range. These quad cities lie in the midst of the great red and brown hematite iron-ore deposits of the Mesabi Range, the richest in the Lake Superior district. The mining and shipping of this ore are its principal industries.

Ore was discovered in the area in1890, and mining was Eveleth's chief industry for many years. Visitors can still view the colorful man-made excavations, from which depths millions of tons of iron ore have been taken and hauled by rail to Duluth. Lumbering came later, and both turned out to be big businesses. At one time Virginia had both the largest White Pine Mill in the world and the biggest ore producing mine - Mesaba Mountain.

The area's rich mining history is celebrated at the Mineview Visitors Information Center, which offers truly breathtaking views of the area's deepest open pit mine. Located 3 miles north of Virginia, the Laurentian Divide is a ridge of low rugged hills meandering through Northern Minnesota that separates the headwaters of streams which flow North and South.

"The Capital of American Hockey", Eveleth has been given that designation - and the home of the United States Hockey Hall of Fame - because of it's rich hockey traditions.

No community the size of Eveleth has produced as many quality players or has contributed more to the growth and development of the sport in the United States.

The United States Hockey Hall of Fame is a national shrine of historical significance dedicated to honoring the great sport of ice hockey in the United States. Visitors experience the thrilling game action and inspiring achievements of players, coaches, builders and administrators through authentic, informative and entertaining displays and memorabilia.



Welcome to "America's Hometown" - Hannibal, Missouri.

Located on the rocky west bank of the Mississippi River, Hannibal was an ideal place to build a wharf. The Mississippi River here is deep and runs quietly. Founded in 1836, the town of Hannibal became a bustling transportation crossroads. Stage coaches, steam boats and keelboats were followed by railroad construction in 1852.

The first railroad mail car in the U.S. was built in Hannibal, as well as the first locomotive built west of the Mississippi River.

The nationally renowned favorite son of Hannibal is Samuel Langhorne Clemens, better known by his pen name *Mark Twain*. He was a famous and popular American humorist, writer and lecturer. He was also a steamboat pilot, gold prospector and journalist. At his peak, he was probably the most popular American celebrity of his time.

The name "Mark Twain" is a pun reference to a riverboat depth measurement indicating two fathoms, or "safe water. "Hannibal is the setting of his *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*. The town's landmarks shout the names found in Mark Twain's books every way your eyes turn.

Historical sites related to Mark Twain and sites depicted in his fiction have become an important part of the towns legacy. Rediscover Mark Twain's life on the Mississippi River by taking a cruise on the Mark Twain Riverboat. Explore the passages and stalactite and stalagmite formations of Mark Twain Cave, or simply drive up to Lovers Leap and learn the tale of two lovers who were together to the end.

In the Historic District, you can visit Mark Twain's Boyhood Home and the home of Becky Thatcher, his boyhood sweetheart. Hannibal also has the largest inland lighthouse in the country. It is a gorgeous area to visit during the fall's blazing colors on the trees regardless of history or story books.

An enjoyable experience awaits you in discovering Hannibal's many points of interest. Take your time, relax and enjoy the many sights and attractions that highlight our community. No matter what you choose to do, you'll find our town of nearly 18,000 population very

accommodating. I'm sure you will agree that Hannibal is a magical experience for individuals and families alike!

The man the airport was named to honor..... The First American Jet Fighter Ace

"This was 'flight suit attitude', ... a sense of self-confidence and pride that verged on arrogance ... the aircraft of preference was the high-performance, single-seat fighter ... This culture placed a premium on cockiness and informality. A flight suit officer spent more time in a flight suit than in a uniform. In his world, status was based upon flying ability, not degrees, rank, or officer' skills."

Like all heroes, his reputation and his legend grows as the passage of time reveals more surely how rare he was. His memory retains the power to inspire, even as the memory of other heroic warriors inspired him. "Good-Bye, Sir," wrote a newspaper man at the time of James Jabara's death, " — Well Done."





When Air Race Classic achieved 501(c)3 status, with a stated goal to support aviation education for women of all ages, another act to encourage college team participation was easy. We established the Air Race Classic Collegiate Challenge Trophy to be presented annually to the top finishing college/university team.

The large traveling trophy, engraved with the winning team's names, will dwell in the school's trophy case one year before moving to the next winner's school. Team members receive small trophies as permanent personal mementos.

Any school with an established aviation program is eligible to send a team of women. Purdue University, Western MichiganUniversity, Ohio University, The Embry Riddle Daytona Beach, University of South Dakota, University of North Dakota and Kansas State University are among those who have sponsored teams.


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
